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Editor's Corner

I n case you were wondering where this edition had got to, it's a little late this month as Jan and I took a little trip down memory lane. In 1971-73 I served in an exchange posting at the US Navy Supply Centre in Oakland, California and recently we decided to spend a couple of weeks in the San Francisco area visiting an old friend and rekindling fond memories of those years.

We had a great couple of weeks with highlights including a trip to the Russian River wine region with our friend who is a non-snob oenophile and therefore added to the overall experience. Another was a performance of *Beach Blanket Babylon*, a hilarious musical satire that has been running in San Francisco for over 30 years (updated to keep it current).

Class Endowment Fund By 6584 Keith Ambachtsheer

Keith provided the following update on the Class Fund, "I just received the CLASS OF 65 ENDOWMENT FUND REPORT from the Foundation. The year 2010 was another a good one for us. Our Fund balance at the start of the

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year was \$633,871.36. Over the course of the year, we paid out \$5000 for the Class of '65 Teaching Excellence Award, and a Foundation Administration Fee of \$6,338.71. Twenty-two classmates contributed \$25,445.03 over the course of 2010. Our investment return attribution for 2010 was 14.9% = \$94,446.83. As a result of all this, our Fund balance on Dec 31 2010 stood at \$742,424.51."

With respect to the Class Leadership Professor, Nikolas Gardner, **Jim Carruthers**, was able to get the following update on from the Principal's office, "As for Nik's plans, I just received an email back from him. He is close to finalizing the deal on his house sale and will be coming to Kingston next week on a house hunting trip. Until he has finalized his sale and purchase of a new home, he cannot say for sure when he will arrive in Kingston but he is hoping to be here by early July."
